experienced sexual misconduct, which includes sexual harassment, sexual assault, dating violence and/or stalking, during the 2015-16 school year.



79%
of undergraduate students who experienced sexual assault identified their assailant as another Princeton undergraduate.



62%
of graduate students who experienced sexual assault identified their assailant as another Princeton graduate student.



Undergraduates who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual or questioning

were **2 times** as likely to experience sexual misconduct than undergraduates who identify as heterosexual or straight.



Sophomores have the greatest odds of experiencing sexual misconduct over the 2015-16 academic year.



49%
of undergraduates who experienced sexual assault first encountered their assailant in an eating club.

Approximately **10%** of graduate women experienced sexual harassment during the 2015-16 school year. 50% of the incidents involved a co-worker, professor, staff member or postdoc.

83% of all students know where to go on campus to get help should they or a friend be sexually assaulted.
